VHOC has three juniors currently training or trialing in various dog sports: Asher Farkas, Sierra Case, and Amanda Prince. Amanda was kind enough to share some highlights from her fabulous year:

Amanda Prince writes:

2010 was a fantastic year for me and my dogs. I worked extremely hard in agility, and we accomplished many incredible things. In the beginning of the year, my two-year old Border Collie, Cayenne, finished her AX title, followed a little later by her AXJ. She also got her first Double Q and several more legs, working towards her MACH. It was an amazing year with my Cavalier King Charles Spaniel. In March of 2010, Rogan and I went to Fresno for the weekend, and came home with the 2010 California Junior Handler of the Year title, and a scholarship for \$500. One of the highlights of 2010, was on May 1st. After a long, but interesting four-year journey, Rogan finished his MACH title! Rogan did not begin his agility career as the dog that he has turned out to be today. Those four years of patience and hard work have absolutely paid off! And finally, on June 30th, Rogan finished as the #1 Cavalier King Charles Spaniel in the country for the 2010 AKC Agility Invitational. December came, and it was time to go to Long Beach to compete at the Invitational. Rogan was fantastic and ran 3 clean rounds out of 4, placing in the top 10 for two of the rounds. The Invitational was truly an amazing experience and something that I will remember forever. I am so proud of how far my little Border Collie, Cayenne, has come in such a short amount of time, and every day, I am more and more amazed with Rogan and his accomplishments.



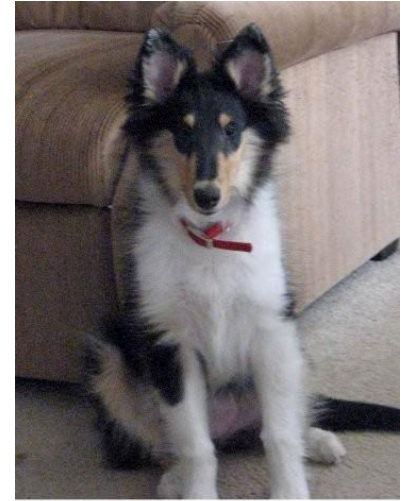

The Force Fetch Debate

There was an article recently published in a local newsletter about the ear pinch method of retrieving which I thought needed an opposing viewpoint, but when submitted it was considered ‘gratuitous attacks’ and ‘a personal issue’ and was refused. Since competition obedience entries have been steadily declining in recent years I feel strongly that misinformation about competitive trainers and their ‘corrective’ techniques, specifically regarding the “force fetch” method, needs an opposing viewpoint to dissuade any other competitors from leaving the sport! You decide for yourself. It’s only intended as a general overview and a response to generally held misconceptions about ‘corrective’ methods of training.

Certainly, almost 15 years ago I had a top trainer almost ruin my Weimaraner with her application of the force fetch – done in much the same way that people generally misunderstand: grasp the dog’s ear, make it vocalize, push the dumb bell in. No matter how many books these trainers write, in my mind and in this day and age, a blind adherence to this is unfair and incorrect. No trainer I know does it this way any longer and I have definitely used the force fetch method on all my subsequent dogs, and on over a dozen other dogs and it has not been the same any two times.

Just a couple quick things:

1. It is imperative that before anyone ever does any type of correction there be a foundation of learning already established. Every dog should view a correction as positive and informational only, never personal. I never work with any dog until he understands this. The dog is already introduced to the dumb bell and knows how to ‘take it’ and ‘hold it’. I’m not introducing any new behaviors at the point of the force fetch, just reinforcing learned behaviors.

2. Remember: every dog is different! Body sensitivities, resistance to compulsion, learning curve, etc. So the process always changes as well. The force fetch doesn’t mean an ‘ear pinch’ only! I have very successfully done pressure on the neck, pop on the collar, squeeze of the collar, squeeze of the ear, or any other level of compulsion that works for the dog. The least amount of compulsion required for each dog – no cookie cutter methods here!



3. Since the dog knows what ‘take it’ means, the handler never ‘pops’ the DB in the dog’s mouth. The dog always reaches for it, when hearing the words, “take it” to much praise and treats and massaging of any area where discomfort has been applied. The dog learns quickly: ‘it’s uncomfortable with the DB out of my mouth, but as soon as I reach for it and put it in my mouth I am lavishly praised and rewarded! Aha!! I love black and white learning experiences!’ And then we don’t have to re-train, ask the dog to ignore distractions, correct the pick up, the hold, etc. The force fetch is only done a handful of times at most throughout a dog’s maybe decade-long career, because the dog has learned quickly and easily what it means. If you have to do it repeatedly then it was never done correctly. Many new trainers do not want to get through this uncomfortable phase of learning, no matter how quickly it is accomplished. It’s unfortunate, as I have seen many positive only trainers who either give up or continually have problems because nothing has helped the dog understand how to ignore something more enticing. Then I hear about how the dog hates the metal article, or the dog can’t hold the glove, etc. etc. Or then again, many dogs decide to only do the ‘fun’ part of the exercise, i.e. retrieving, and have no responsibility for holding or sitting in front.

I always say: Don’t forget about the Ying and Yang of dog training! However hard you correct is how positive you have to be! It’s no longer, ‘I’m only a ‘corrective’ trainer’ or ‘I’m only a ‘positive trainer’. We’ve come too far and we’re all too smart for that. All my dogs have been happy, fast retrievers. No matter what mistakes they make in the ring it’s not for lack of love of their work.

This is by no means a comprehensive overview, but hopefully has given insight into the ‘other side’ of obedience training and might keep a couple of you coming back for more! So in the future, when you hear people ‘bash’ competition obedience or ‘competitive’ people as using only harsh methods or dismiss them as just another ‘corrective’ trainer you’ll know it’s often merely for lack of information.
